Peter Lederer's Journey From War-Torn Europe to Woodlake



Born in Prostějov, Czechoslovakia, in 1934, Peter Lederer's early years were shaped by global turmoil. As the Nazi threat closed in, Peter's Jewish family fled in late 1939, leaving behind the family business for the unknown—a journey that would eventually span Panama, California, Philadelphia, and beyond.

The Lederers landed in Panama City, Panama, in late 1939, escaping the horrors of the Holocaust. Like many refugees, they arrived with no money, no familiarity with the culture, and no knowledge of the language. To make matters more difficult, US immigration policies prevented Peter's father (who was born in Romania) from initially accompanying the family when they moved from Panama to the US in 1947. Despite this separation, Peter's mother navigated the challenges of exile with strength, raising Peter and his twin brother George in a foreign land.

The boys quickly adjusted to life in Panama, where they attended a Catholic school and became fluent in Spanish before learning English. They later picked up English by watching Hollywood westerns with Spanish subtitles. Deeply bonded, the brothers shared the same classrooms from first grade through college.

In 1947, Peter and George entered the US on student visas, becoming US citizens in 1954. He and his brother, George, were first enrolled at San Rafael

Military Academy (1947–1949) before transferring to Lowell High School in San Francisco (1949–1953), where he and George became tennis standouts.

Their father, stuck in Panama due to visa issues, began selling Swiss watches to US military personnel in the Panama Canal Zone, building a successful business that restored some stability for the family.

From 1953 to 1957, Peter and George attended the University of California, Santa Barbara (UCSB), where Peter earned a B.A. in political science and philosophy. While there, he and his brother led UCSB to four consecutive conference tennis championships, building their reputations as gifted athletes.

After graduating, Peter and his brother were drafted into the US Army, serving from 1957 to 1959. Following an honorable discharge, Peter struggled to find employment. Despite lacking high-society connections, he forged his path by selling mutual funds door-to-door—often scheduling evening appointments after striking up conversations with homemakers during the day. His determination paid off, eventually launching a career in finance when he joined Stewart, Ewbanks & Meyerson on the New York Stock Exchange in 1960.

Peter's career was briefly interrupted by geopolitics. In 1961, following the construction of the Berlin Wall, Peter and George were recalled to active duty. Stationed at Fort Leonard Wood, Missouri, they served in special services, offering tennis lessons to officers' families. It was a year of relative comfort in an otherwise tense global moment.

In 1962, Peter transitioned into the steel business, joining Caine Steel Company in Emeryville, California as a salesman. By 1966, he was promoted to General Manager of Northern California, and in 1967, he was transferred to Philadelphia to lead operations there.

Philadelphia became a pivotal chapter. Tasked with turning around a failing branch, Peter succeeded by shifting procurement to Japanese steel—far cheaper than domestic sources. His leadership quickly returned the branch to profitability. However, in 1969, the company was sold to a New York entrepreneur who installed his sons in leadership. Realizing his

growth there had peaked, Peter left the company and returned to finance.

Peter became a broker once more in 1969, working over the next two decades for firms including Smith Barney, Loeb Rhoades, Shearson American Express, and Shearson Lehman. In this new chapter, Peter again proved his knack for rebuilding. He arrived in Philadelphia knowing no one, yet built a flourishing financial career and deep civic ties.

From 1981 to 1988, he served as President and Senior Trustee of Lower Merion County and its Police Pension Fund, overseeing municipal and public safety finances for the prestigious Philadelphia Main Line region. He also served as Chairman of the Cystic Fibrosis Charity Tennis Tournament in Narberth, PA, a role that combined his lifelong love of tennis with philanthropy.

In 1988, Peter returned to California to be closer to his aging parents, who were living in Westlake. Wanting a more comfortable and connected environment for them, he convinced his parents to relocate to the Woodlake community. Peter purchased a condo for himself, and his parents bought one nearby. They all moved into Woodlake, where Peter has lived ever since. His parents spent their final years in this peaceful setting—a decision Peter holds close to his heart.

Peter joined Dean Witter Reynolds, Inc. in San Mateo that same year. Later, he continued his career working for two foreign exchange trading companies based in

China and Russia. He served as president of IFTN, a Russian-owned foreign exchange bank, before retiring in 1996 following a cancer diagnosis.

Peter's personal life was closely intertwined with that of his twin. He and George had a double wedding in 1963, marrying sisters they had met through a synagogue connection in Daly City. Though raised Catholic in Panama and exposed to Judaism later, Peter often described himself as a "study in comparative religions," deeply interested in cultural and spiritual traditions across faiths.

Peter later found lifelong companionship with Doris, his partner of over 30 years. On October 22, 2022, they were married—a moment he proudly calls the best decision he ever made. He has a son, born from his first marriage, who resides in Los Angeles.

Even in retirement, at 90 years old, he remains engaged—managing his investments and swimming daily to stay active. He and Doris enjoy traveling along the Pacific Coast, from Mexico up to the scenic shores of Mendocino. A history buff and lover of literature and culture, Peter's life reflects a deep appreciation for the opportunities he has been given.

Peter Lederer's story—from fleeing Czechoslovakia as a child to rebuilding a life across continents to leading financial institutions in major American cities—is remarkable. He succeeded not through privilege but through persistence, adaptability, and a sharp, empathetic mind.

Woodlake IDs Required:

You must have a Woodlake ID to use any of our facilities, including the pools, gym, and tennis courts. Minors 14 years and older should also have IDs. Children under 14 years old must be accompanied and supervised by a parent or guardian when using the facilities. Don't forget your pets. They need to have Woodlake IDs, too! The RSAs regularly check IDs, so be sure to carry your ID or store a photo of it on your cell phone.

Best of all, despite these improvements, we were able to secure **significant cost savings!**

Of course, we hope we never have to use it, but we feel great about this new insurance coverage for Woodlake!

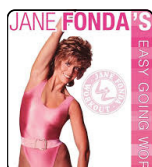

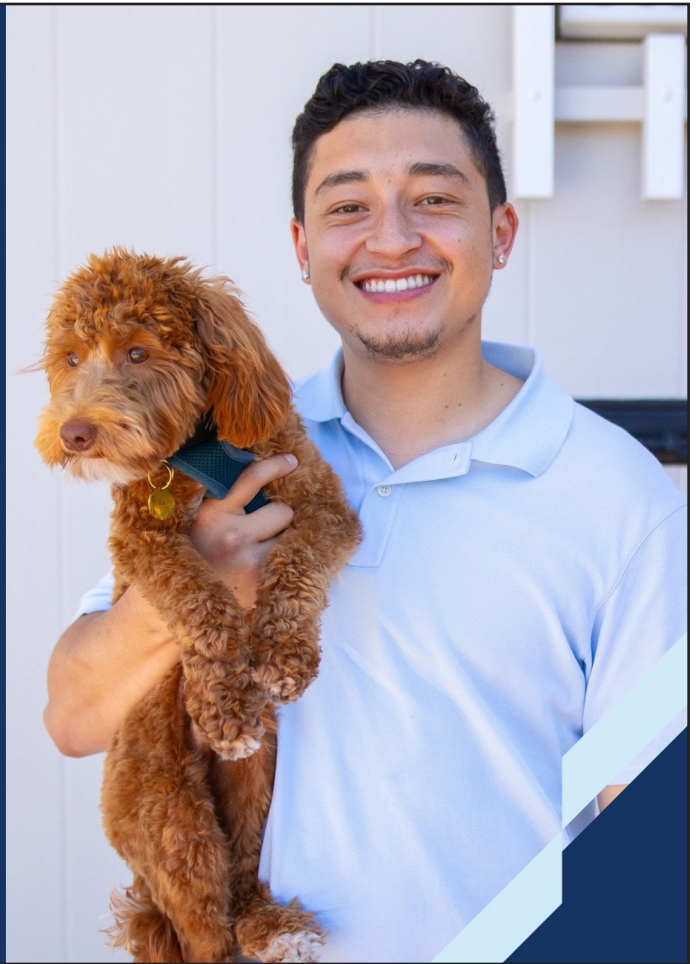
